Lenten Soup Supper and Study Scripture and the Life of God Begins Wednesday, February 21, 2018

During our recent sermon series, we looked at the discovery of the Scripture scroll in the temple in Jerusalem as a catalyst that King Josiah on a mission to reform the nation. Real reform and revival has always involved God's people reengaging God's Word. When we read Scripture well, it brings us in line with God's story, God's will, and God's intention for us and for creation. (Paragraph) In this six-week Lenten study, Pastor Bob Kaylor will teach us how to read the Bible in a way that brings us more deeply into the life God intends for us. Using Paul's Letter to the Galatians as an example, we'll explore various ways of looking at the biblical text, learn about its context as well as its content, and discover how to read it for understanding and application. When we read Scripture well and in the context of a community of others, we encounter it as the life-changing Word of God.

The cross. It's the symbol that is most associated with Christianity and, in our world, it's a symbol that seems to be everywhere. We see it on buildings, we wear it as jewelry, and even stick it on our cars. From the simple wooden cross like the ones we have in front of our church to the beautifully crafted ones we display in our homes, the cross is something sacred to Christians.

But if we were living in the first century Roman world, people would be shocked and scandalized at our fascination with the cross. For them, the cross was the most horrible form of capital punish-



ment imaginable—a hideous instrument of death reserved for slaves and treasonous revolutionaries. It was such a horrific symbol that people wouldn't even mention it in polite company, let alone have one in their home or wear it around their neck.

And yet, in the midst of that world, the early Christians began to proclaim that the cross was actually a symbol of victory, redemption, and hope for the world. They claimed that the world's true Messiah and King was a Jewish peasant who had been crucified but had also risen from the dead, ushering in the Kingdom of God. In fact, they said, because of his cross humanity was set free from sin and death.

Their Roman and Jewish neighbors both heard this news as scandalous. The apostle Paul, a Jew living and working the Roman world, recognized their confusion. "The message of the cross is foolishness to those who are perishing," he wrote to the Corinthian church, "but it is the power of God for those who are being saved... Jews ask for signs, and Greeks look for wisdom, but we preach Christ crucified, which is a scandal to Jews and foolishness to Gentiles."

The cross is still a scandal today in world that is perishing. For Paul and the early Christians, however, the cross was the symbol of salvation and not destruction. Within 300 years, most of the people of the Roman empire would come to believe it, too.

Today, most Christians will eagerly speak the truth that "Jesus died on the cross for my sins." But how exactly does that work? How did the horrific death of a wandering teacher in the backwater of the Roman empire become the most important moment in history? How does the death of Jesus save the world?

In this Lenten series, I want to explore the meaning of Jesus' crucifixion and how that death, and Jesus' resurrection from the dead, become the means of salvation for humanity. We'll draw from the Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments, from the history of crucifixion in the Roman world, and from great thinkers and theologians over the centuries to answer the question of how the cross of Christ saves us. When we understand the message of the cross, we find real hope for the real world.


The message of the cross is the most important message ever spoken. Join us during the six Sundays of Lent as we explore that message together.



Linance Update

2017 Financial Results

We were truly blessed by your financial support in 2017. General fund giving was \$793,482. Your generosity covered general fund expenditures of \$759,269 and additional expenditures including a new roof on the church. In addition, TLUMC received a \$50,000 grant from the Lilly Foundation which means that Pastor Bob's study leave in 2018 will have no impact upon the 2018 budget. The adopted general fund expense budget for 2018 is \$837,347.

Q&A WITH EMMET CAHILL

Who were/are your musical influences? My parents. My Mom and Dad used to travel the country singing and playing at church ceremonies. So as we (Emmet, his older sister Laura and his younger brother Aaron) got older, they used to bring us along and allow us to join in. We had a family band at one stage called Musicahill Quartet. We were known as the "Irish von Trapps."

You sing everything from opera to Broadway show tunes to Irish classics to contemporary covers. Which is your first love, musically? Probably the toughest question for a singer to answer. My first love was definitely classical music. My parents used to play music all the time at home and in the car when we were going anywhere. The music could vary from Disney songs, musical theater, classical music music to Irish folks songs. My Dad played old John McCormack [world-famous Irish-American tenor in the early 20th century] records in the house too, which really got me interested in the old classic Irish songs.

Dream opera role? Right now, it would be the role of Papageno in Mozart's Die Zauberflute. Someday I'd like to play Figaro in The Barber of Seville.

Is performing in a Broadway musical anywhere on your radar? Absolutely. There is nothing like experiencing a live theater show and to be part of one on Broadway would be wonderful. I've been very busy touring over the past few years so it would be lovely to be settled somewhere like New York for awhile and get the chance to perform in the same theater every night. I am eager to try new things at this point and develop as a performer so I will hopefully get a break from the road at some point and make that happen.

Do you plan to make the USA your home in the near future? It already feels like my second home given the amount of time I've spent there over the past 7 years, so a move there is probably in the cards soon.

You've done several solo tours in the US in the last 4 years. How does doing a solo show/tour compare with being a principal singer with Celtic Thunder? It's very different in a lot of ways. It's a lot more work for me personally to organize, but hugely rewarding. When I go out on stage every night and receive such a wonderful wave of support, it makes all those late night calls, interviews and emails worth it. It's similar in that I see so many wonderful friends I have made during my time with Celtic Thunder. They have followed me from my days in the show and now travel all around the country to see me - some people have even flown from Australia to see my Los Angeles show. I am blessed with an incredibly loyal following. I do my best every night to repay their support.

"Always There" – one of your favorites, if not the favorite, song you performed while in Celtic Thunder. What is it about the song that you like so much? I remember where I was the very first time I heard it. I remember feeling very emotional hearing the song and wanted to record it straight away. I think it's a song that everyone can take inspiration from, no matter what they are going through in their lives. I wanted to be the person on stage every night delivering the message of hope that it brings.

While on tour with Celtic Thunder in 2016, you visited local churches on Sunday mornings and sang to the congregations. Why get up and sing in church on Sundays when you can sleep in after performing in a show on Saturday night? Singing in church is something I miss so much when I'm away from home. I've been doing it for as long as I can remember. I've been the cantor out at the cathedral in Mullingar (Cahill's hometown in Ireland) for over 15 years now, so the opportunity to share and worship with people all over America has been a very humbling experience.

Tell us about your official debut album which came out last February. What do you want people to know about you and Irish music after listening to your album? I think it's an album that is very identifiable with me as a person. I am very proud to be Irish. I brought some well-loved Irish songs to people in, what I hope, is a new way. I want people to feel a real connection to the songs, as well as the people and the stories that they represent. There has always been a special relationship between the Irish and American people and I want to further enrich that friendship. I want people to take their own personal meaning from each song.

Why are Americans so fascinated with Irish singers and musicians? I think Irish music is so steeped in identity and history and that is something that translates all over the world. I feel very honored to be able to bring the Irish songs and stories to people all over the United States. That sense of identity is a huge part of who I am as a person.

What are your plans for 2018 beyond the release of your touring with Celtic Thunder in the fall? I plan to tour the States solo from February through May and make lots of new friends along the way.

How did (Celtic Thunder Assistant Music Director) Seamus Brett land the job as accompanist for your solo tours? He seems to be gaining a fan base, too! Seamus and I got to know each other very well on the Celtic Thunder tours, and as you will see at the concert, he is an amazing musician and very entertaining, too!

Have you tried your hand at writing your own songs? Can we expect an Emmet Cahill composition one of these days? Yes, I have started writing in recent years. I hope to share those with people on future projects.

The Celtic Thunder 10th Anniversary tour this fall will be 4 months long, 70+ cities across the USA and Canada. Does it get old singing the same songs every night as opposed to doing shorter solo tours and changing up the set list every night? How do you keep it fresh night after night? No, it doesn't get old because every audience, theater, city is different. We do change things up a little on occasion, but this show has been going down so well that we are happy to stick with what we are doing now.

While on tour with Celtic Thunder, you are interacting with your fellow singers and band members, road crew and fans on a daily basis. How do you recharge your batteries and get some "alone" time? I love my coffee, first off, so I tend to frequent a local coffee stop and get some work done, as is the case at this very moment! I also call home every single day.

What's the most important thing you've learned about yourself while doing solo tours in terms of your strengths and weaknesses? That I have many strengths, and definitely many weaknesses. You learn so much about yourself, and how much you value people's support whilst out on the road. I am always met with a welcoming smile from the audiences, which is so appreciated. I have learned a lot about people's goodwill and generosity, and I hope that I repay that in some small way by performing for people, making them feel like they know me and by giving them my time.

Where do you see yourself musically 5-10 years from now? Still singing Irish classics and popular music or concentrating more on classical music?

I am very ambitious. I have dreams and goals to achieve, but I don't like to obsess too much about the future. If you do, you don't get to appreciate all the wonderful things happening in the present, and there is so much good happening in my life and career right now that I so cherish. I'm always looking to develop as a performer, for the audience's sake and my own, but Irish music will always be a huge part of my life; that will never change. It's ingrained in me as a person and I am proud to fly the flag for the Irish people of today, and the Irish people who travelled the world before me. They are the people I pay homage to every night when I stand on stage and tell their stories through song.
